Directors' Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

The Directors (who are also Trustees for the purpose of charity law) are pleased to present their report together with the charity's financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2025.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting Policies set out in Note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2019).

Objectives and Activities

The charitable objectives are to advance and proclaim the Christian faith through the provision and development of health and education services principally in Bolivia and the Amazon region and the relief of poverty of persons living in the same geographical area. The charity fulfils its objectives through its partnership with Bolivian registered charity, *Fundación Totai*, which is based in the city of Trinidad in the Beni (North East) region of Bolivia.

Funding raised in Scotland is transferred monthly to *Fundación Totai* to help finance the Bolivian charity's activities in Trinidad.

During the year ended 31 March 2025, £30,100 representing 98.3% of Foundation Totai's total income was remitted to Trinidad, Bolivia. Funding from Scotland represents approximately 40% of *Fundación Totai*'s annual income which is supplemented by income generated through health service provision by the Health Centre in Trinidad, Bolivia.

The majority of funding from Scotland is allocated to the work of the Health Centre which was opened in April 2007 and, since then, has offered extremely low cost dental, ENT, audiology, gynaecology, cardiology, rheumatology, endocrinology, dermatology, urology, paediatric, physiotherapy, speech therapy, pharmacy and GP services to help meet the medical needs of those living in Trinidad-Beni. Such services continue to be provided without charge to those who cannot afford to pay noting that the average monthly wage in Bolivia, subject to currency exchange fluctuations, is approximately £550. Modest fees obtained from those who can pay for treatment help to finance the Health Centre's running costs. The Health Centre is equipped with two operating theatres. Periodic use of the operating theatres by local or visiting surgeons as well as their occasional hire to other medical groups in Trinidad-Beni help to provide an income stream.

Most of the Doctors providing medical services are engaged on a self-employment basis ranging from an average of 12 to 20 hours per week and receive 50% of their extremely modest consultation fees. Doctors in Bolivia are remunerated very poorly in comparison to UK Doctors and Consultants.

The charity's main activities include the delivery of health services through programmes of Primary Health Care, Public Health and Specialist Services both to the local community of Trinidad-Beni, Bolivia and to rural and urban areas in the (Amazon) Beni region of Bolivia. *Fundación Totai*'s iOye Bolivia (Hear Bolivia), a nationally acclaimed programme, leads the way in Ear and Hearing healthcare in the Beni region.

The charity also reaches out to the local Trinidad community via the **Totai Academy** which provides educational support, music and sports programmes. Funding from Scotland helps to sustain such activities of which further details are provided below.

All of the charity's activities are run in close association with a church known as *El Jireh* ('God will provide') which uses an upstairs multi-functional hall in the Health Centre building for its meetings. The *El Jireh* church partners *Fundación Totai* in serving the local community.



Achievements and Performance

HEALTH

The medical work, both on and off-site, delivered **9,313** consultations during the year ended 31 December 2024 (2023 – 5,629) representing a daily average of 36 (2023 – 22). A significant 3,684 increase largely due to (1) successful marketing campaigns about the Health Centre's facilities and (2) more people in and around the neighbourhood of Trinidad prioritising their health and experiencing the benefits of healthcare. The low-cost Health Centre has helped people afford the medical care they need noting that medical specialties are provided at approximately one third of the cost compared to other health care facilities in Trinidad.

- *Fundación Totai's* ENT (Ear, Nose & Throat) service was offered whenever practically possible during the year ended 31 December 2024 by the Health Centre. Locally based surgeons ran morning consultations and oversaw surgery with their work being complemented by Ear and Hearing Care practitioners and audiologists. Much of the Ear and Hearing work took place off-site, with regular hearing checks carried out throughout Trinidad at Health Centres, Day Care Centres and the Maternity Hospital. A continuing priority was delivering health care to outlying rural areas who have limited access to health care.



- With an ever-deepening awareness of the need to promote the inclusion of deaf people in Trinidad-Beni, the Health Centre continued to roll out training courses in the Bolivian Sign Language programme.
- The urology service which was launched in September 2023 continued to attract demand with a low cost offering to patients involving clinical laboratory analysis and medication to help with ongoing treatment.
- The offering of Endocrinology, a medical service which until recently has largely been inaccessible in the Trinidad-Beni region, continues to bring help particularly to the elderly in addressing diabetes, thyroid function and obesity.
- Dental facilities within the Health Centre are equipped with modern X-ray equipment which offers panoramic digital radiography for adults and children for skull and maxillary sinuses X-rays and another extremely valuable service to the local community.
- Working in partnership with *Claro Vision*, an Optician outlet from the city of Santa Cruz, a campaign to assess patients' vision was held in May 2024 with free eye tests with many people benefitting from low-cost spectacles. We are deeply grateful for the partnership and practical support of *Claro Vision* which has contributed to the visual wellbeing of many people who otherwise would have no access to such services.



Achievements and Performance (continued)

- In December 2024, a further optometry campaign was held to make quality eye care more accessible to the community of Trinidad. Participants received professional eye tests and prescriptions for just a fifth of the usual cost in Trinidad. Attendees also had the opportunity to choose from a range of stylish frames at significantly discounted prices thereby enabling attendees to leave with improved vision, comfort and confidence. The campaign was very effective and continues to make a real and lasting difference.



TOTAÍ ACADEMY – *Let's learn together*

Sadly, many children living in Trinidad do not have internet access. Concerned that a significant number of children living in the neighbourhood of the Health Centre do not attend school or are falling behind academically, our aim is to provide these children in first to third grades with academic support through sessions focussed on literacy and mathematics. During the year, some children progressed from being unable to recognise letters to reading simple text and solving basic arithmetic problems. These successes would not have been possible without the commitment of our team. The overarching goal is to facilitate the re-enrolment of these children in school and to ensure their progress and development thereafter.




The children's music programme, launched in September 2023 to help children learn to play a variety of instruments including guitar, bass, keyboard, ukulele and cajon, continues to exceed expectations whilst helping children and families to connect with each other in the neighbourhood surrounding the Health Centre and Totaí Academy.

Achievements and Performance (continued)

TOTAÍ ACADEMY – Arts & Crafts

The Arts & Crafts group continued to use the Health Centre building on Saturday afternoons. Run by local volunteer, Dr. Ruth Obando, this activity reaches women in the local community for whom a few hours on a Saturday afternoon may be their only weekly opportunity to get out of the house. Courses taught include working with fabric, embroidery and craft techniques using recycled paper, bottles, cardboard and other items.



By learning new skills, the ladies are able to help support their families. The women's group, attended by an average of 10 ladies over 25 afternoons, were given a number of opportunities throughout the year to display and sell their work, from within the Health Centre building and at local exhibitions. The weekly group also have a short devotional time which includes a reflection from the Bible.

TOTAÍ ACADEMY – Futsal School

One of the Futsal School's practical objectives is to offer children a meaningful, physical activity and make sports accessible to all. During the year, an average of 75 children - a mix of boys and girls - regularly attended training sessions with teams participating in local Trinidad leagues in age categories, under-7s, under-9s and under-11's. Many of the children come from families living below the poverty line thereby limiting their access to essentials such as footballs, trainers, socks and strips. To participate in the local leagues, players require proper equipment so, the Futsal School offers a "borrow to play" system where players can use trainers, socks and strips during games whilst returning them immediately afterwards for cleaning and readiness for the next matches. This system ensures that every child, regardless of their family circumstances, can play in tournaments representing the Futsal School. Futsal shirts are provided bearing the logo of *Fundación Totai* and the name of each child.



The Futsal School programme is not just about matches and trophies – it is about building relationships with boys, girls and families and creating opportunities to support families in practical ways. For example, as the new academic year began, six children were provided with new uniforms, shoes, and school supplies, thereby ensuring they started the year with confidence and dignity.

Since its launch, the Futsal School has relied on gaining access to local pitches...not necessarily grass covered...for training sessions. The development during the year of a Futsal pitch in the grounds of *Fundación Totai* has proved a boon and enabled the Futsal School to schedule training sessions unaffected by other events or demands. Having access to a dedicated pitch also offers a safe place for children from the community to engage in sports activities more readily. A long-term aspiration would be for the Futsal School to have its own astra turf surface with floodlights facilitating evening play as well as providing an attractive community hub.

Andrés Torrico Franco (...pictured in the white strip) started attending former *Fundación Totaí*'s Football School when he was just 5 years old. Thanks to hard work, sacrifice, perseverance and discipline, Andrés (21) now plays professionally with the national **Potosí** football team which competes in the Bolivian Professional Football League. As a child, "Andreco" (his nickname) lived three blocks from *Fundación Totaí* and attended *El Jireh* church. Over time, he joined larger local teams in Trinidad and signed as a professional with **Potosí**. We are delighted to have coached him as a little boy and continue to follow his progress on televised football matches. Well done, Andreco!



OTHER INFORMATION

Operational matters in Trinidad

In June 2023, the Board of *Fundación Totaí* struck a partnership with *Red Roots*, a small American non-profit organisation that has been working in community development in Trinidad-Beni for a number of years. *Red Roots* assumed administrative responsibilities for the Health Centre and the *Totaí* Academy. This important partnership has helped to extend the reach of the Health Centre's work and programmes offered by the *Totaí* Academy.

Local Employment

The charity's activities in Trinidad-Beni helped to provide employment opportunities for 35 people – a mix of part-time medical contractors (24) and support staff (11).

Volunteers

Simon Howling from West Sussex, England, who assisted the Sports work in Trinidad-Beni for two years until March 2021 whilst attached to the UK Christian agency, *Latin Link*, continues to serve voluntarily as Sport Director for *Fundación Totaí*. Simon is pursuing his first FIFA football coaching licence which will further help the development and standards of the Football School. Simon's leadership and work is greatly appreciated



Visits to Bolivia

Travelling from Scotland with her young son, Rachel Peebles, Director, (seen, far right) visited Trinidad in July 2024 and was able to draw alongside the *Fundación Totaí* staff and renew contact with many families in the community which she knows well from her time when she served as a long-term volunteer community worker. Rachel funded her trip to Trinidad personally.



Economic and political situation in Bolivia

Life for many living in the Trinidad-Beni region is extremely difficult with rampant inflation (...22% in September 2025) causing spiralling food prices and continual fuel shortages. Bolivia hopes that the recently elected President, Rodrigo Paz, will bring much needed political stability, end Bolivia's isolation and improve relations with other countries and seek to maximise revenue from the country's vast and proven reserves of natural gas.

Financial Review

Funding

Funding received in the UK is provided by a small but committed group of sponsors (individuals and Trusts) who give to the charity's medical work (General Fund) and to the Totai Academy (Restricted Funds). No statutory funding is sought or received. Funds from Scotland are remitted to Bolivia each month by electronic transfer into the local bank in Trinidad-Beni used by the Bolivian charity, *Fundación Totai* and receipted promptly thereafter by *Fundación Totai*. We are grateful for the consistent support of our sponsors.

Results for the year

Per the *Statement of Financial Activities* on page 10, the charity reported Net Income (i.e. a Surplus) for the year of £32 (2024 – Deficit £32) and total funds at 31 March 2025 of £1,116 (2024 - £1,084) of which £433 related to Restricted Funds.

Reserves Policy

The Directors seek to maximise the release of gift income to Bolivia and only maintain free reserves sufficient to meet the charity's annual administrative costs. At the year end, free reserves (per the General Fund on page 10) amounted to £683 (2024 - £859) which was acceptable to the Directors.

Risk management

The Directors review and assess the major risks to which the charity is exposed on an ongoing basis and have established procedures to mitigate the risks identified by the reviews.

Future plans

The Directors will continue to (1) transfer funds monthly to *Fundación Totai* in Trinidad-Beni, Bolivia (2) keep sponsors and funders updated about activities in Trinidad-Beni via quarterly electronic and hard copy Newsletters alongside information posted on the charity's website (3) engage in virtual bi-monthly meetings with the leadership team in Trinidad-Beni to assess progress on the ground and improve the flow of financial information from Trinidad-Beni and (4) when opportunities arise, seek to attract grant funding for specialist medical equipment which would enhance the services offered by the Health Centre in Trinidad-Beni whilst also increasing revenue.

Structure, Governance and Management

Legal Status

Foundation Totai ("the charity") is a private company limited by guarantee (No. SC297194) and a recognised Scottish charity (No. SC037260), governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The charitable company was incorporated on 15 February 2006.

Appointment of Directors

The Directors of the charity are its Trustees for the purpose of charity law. New Directors are nominated for appointment by the existing Directors and take part in an induction programme which aims to familiarise them with the charity's values, aims and objectives together with its day-to-day operations, in addition to clarifying their statutory responsibilities as Directors of a company limited by guarantee and Trustees of a charity.

Structure, Governance and Management (continued)**Organisational and Administrative Structure**

The Directors serve voluntarily and are responsible for the overall direction of the charity including its financial affairs. The Directors try to meet in person twice yearly and virtually at short notice, if required, whilst two Directors tend to meet bi-monthly virtually with two of the Health Centre's leadership team. The charity has no employees.

Statement of Directors' Responsibilities

The Directors, who are also the Trustees for the purpose of charity law, are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs and of its income and expenditure, including its surplus or deficit for that year. In preparing those financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and the principles in the Charities SORP FRS 102;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is appropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the charitable company's financial position and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the charitable company's assets and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner

Alison Franks C.A. of Cornerstone Accounting Ltd, Chartered Accountants, was appointed Independent Examiner on 12 June 2024 to firstly undertake the Independent Examination of the charity's Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2024. The Directors recommend that Alison Franks C.A. remains in office as Independent Examiner until further notice.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

1 Accounting Policies

Charity information

Foundation Totai is a private charitable company limited by guarantee and incorporated in Scotland. The charity's registered office address is 8 Bentinck Meadow, Bentinck Crescent, Troon KA10 6GZ.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their Accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The Directors consider there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Funds are classified as either Restricted Funds or Unrestricted Funds, defined as follows:

Restricted Funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Unrestricted Funds are expendable at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the Unrestricted Funds are earmarked at the discretion of the Directors for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the Directors' discretion to apply the fund.

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

1.5 Donations

Donations are recognised when the charity has evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably. Entitlement usually arises immediately upon receipt, however, in the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Accounting Policies (continued)

1.6 Gift Aid

Income Tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the respective donation has been recognised and the recoverable amount of Income Tax can be measured reliably; this is normally when the donor has completed the relevant Gift Aid Declaration Form. Income Tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is allocated to the same Fund as the respective donation unless specified by the donor.

1.7 Investment income

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1.8 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Liabilities are measured on recognition at historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings.

1.9 Expenditure on charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by the charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities. The cost of charitable activities presented in the *Statement of Financial Activities* includes the transfer of funds to the Bolivian charity, *Fundación Totai* in Trinidad-Beni and the Independent Examiner's fee.

1.10 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.

1.11 Financial instruments

The charity has no complex financial instruments but does hold basic financial instruments of; cash at bank, debtors and creditors.

Cash and cash equivalents include cash at bank and on hand.

Debtors and Creditors are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.
